Response letter by Scottish students to the RCR position statement: The radiology crisis in Scotland: sustainable solutions are needed now.

We are graduating at a time when the National Health Service (NHS) is under more pressure than ever before. Changing demographics have led to caring for a population with increasingly complex care requirements whilst facing staffing shortages. We find ourselves struggling to maximise the efficiency of overstretched resources which has left us facing increased patient waiting times and an overall lower public opinion of the service^[1]. We are the future of the radiography workforce in Scotland. We graduate aware of the drivers and barriers of modern health and social care delivery, with a desire to improve service provision to our patients where possible.

During our studies, the potential routes we can take in advancing practice in radiography and how we can improve the quality of service we provide to our patients by doing so becomes incredibly clear. We have been inspired by the work of advanced practitioner radiographers, policy makers and our own professional body in researching and piloting new methods of approaching care delivery and the challenges facing our service. The second annual Scottish Inter-University Conference focused on advancing practice and the developing role of the consultant radiographer, a concept which is hugely exciting to us. Throughout our training, we are taught the importance of collaboration with other professionals in order to tackle issues and be prepared to extend our scope of practice as we learn and grow within the profession. It is therefore disappointing when we find ourselves in the final stages of preparing to enter clinical practice that the Royal College of Radiologists (RCR) February 2017^[12] suggest that use of radiographer's skills and experience in extended reporting roles is of little value to the service.

This is somewhat disappointing as seven years earlier in 2010 a similar situation arose. The subsequent time-consuming debate and discussion led to the Society and College of Radiographers (SCoR) and the RCR joint document entitled *Team Working in Clinical Imaging* which launched in September 2012. This joint publication set the tone for what was meant to be more acceptable and amicable future practices and defined the key components of team working as essential for high quality, effective clinical imaging services. It was hoped this would pave the way for positive future working as team working was deemed to be at the heart of clinical practice and imaging was pivotal to modern health care and an essential component for many patient journeys. The RCR & SCoR^[15] documentation identified that the complementary and combined skills of radiologists and radiographers was vital to the delivery of imaging services within the UK. In an attempt to ensure fitness for purpose the SCoR specified that practitioners engaged in clinical reporting must have acquired, **without exception**, a SCoR approved postgraduate qualification in the fields of clinical reporting which included skills development and competence assessment.

In concordance the World Health Organisation (WHO) released a publication^[2] recognising the current global health workforce crisis, and highlighted the need for collaborative working amongst professionals to integrate services. WHO stated that interprofessional working strengthens healthcare systems and improves patient outcomes. This was contextualised by the Scottish Government, who responded with the 2020 Vision^[3] emphasising the importance of integration of services and appropriating the use of skills within each profession to benefit the service.

Radiographers are equally as capable of providing accurate and timely reports as radiologists which has been found in several studies^[4,5,6,7]. NHS trusts in England have been more accepting of the change, and the benefits of reporting radiographers are well recognised^[8]. The initiative is reported to be cost effective, with an average saving of £23.40 being made per radiographer report in Accident and Emergency^[9]. This allows radiologists to concentrate on complex diagnoses and interventions rather than being delayed by the extensive backlog of unreported conventional images which can be reported just as competently by radiographers. In 2007, 85% of radiologists in Scotland supported advancing practice^[10] yet a lack of support from radiologists was found to be a major barrier in the implementation of reporting radiographers in 2016^[11]. This resistance to change which has presented again in the RCR statement^[12] is detrimental to the working relationship in radiology and instigative of tension between the two professions. Ultimately, radiologists must use their knowledge and expertise to develop and trial new procedures and focus on complex cases, such as interventional oncology and advancing acute stroke treatments as stated by the RCR^[12]. Therefore it is only logical that radiographers advance to reporting roles in order to pick up the backlog and assist in improving timely diagnosis for patients.

Resistance to change from medical governing bodies has been famously seen before. During the conception of the NHS, Aneurin "Nye" Bevan was barraged by scrutiny from the British Medical Association (BMA) with an overwhelming attempt to stop the bill from enabling the creation of such a service. The NHS has gone on to become the most innovative health care system on the planet^[13], benefitting millions of patients every year. How fortunate that those with this vision for improved service provision did not give up despite the overwhelming opposition, and we must echo their determination.

We as Scottish final year students believe that in order to maintain effective and safe service provision we must work closely with our colleagues in radiology to develop this service by making best use of our skills and partaking in the development of radiographer reporting roles. Our journey has already begun as a result of the Society and College of Radiographers^[14] challenging all educational institutions delivering undergraduate radiography programmes to 'firmly embed image interpretation and reporting into the undergraduate syllabus by 2010'. Despite the current barriers, we will continue to strive towards radiographers attaining advanced practice roles, ensuring a safe and sustainable service to patients.
